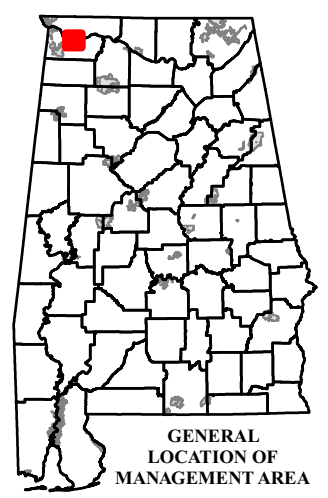

This AREA Permit must be signed and in your possession along with the appropriate license(s) in order to be valid.

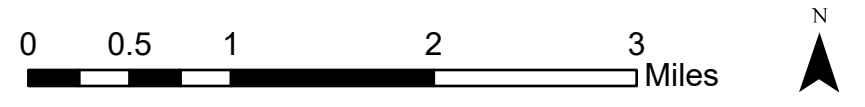

Hunting Regulations – September 2021– August 2022

LICENSE/PERMIT REQUIREMENTS:

- In compliance with 220-2-.55, a Wildlife Management Area License (required for deer, turkey and waterfowl), the applicable Resident or Non-Resident Hunting License [for Alabama residents 16 through 64 years of age and for non-residents 16 years of age and older], are required for hunting on AREAS; provided however that properly licensed persons under the “Wildlife Heritage License” may hunt legal small game, except waterfowl, on AREAS without the other licenses described herein. In order to hunt waterfowl on AREAS, all persons must have, in addition to the otherwise required licenses and permit, a HIP and valid State (ages 16 through 64) and Federal (ages 16 and over) Waterfowl Stamp.
- In addition to license and stamp requirements, an AREA Permit and a WMA daily permit are required unless using the Outdoor Alabama WMA Check-In application to check in and out each hunt day.

NOTES:

- Seven Mile WMA is within the BUFFER ZONE OF THE CHRONIC WASTING DISEASE MANAGEMENT ZONE
- Youth hunters on youth deer and turkey hunts must be less than 16 years of age. Supervisors must be 21 years old or older, or a parent, and must be properly licensed. Youth must remain within 30 feet of supervisors at all times.
- Administrators of the hunt shall have the right to distribute the hunters and to inspect all vehicles or other equipment while on the WMA. The Department of Conservation and Natural Resources and landowners, who are making the hunting possible, hereby put each hunter on notice that he hunts at his own risk and the Department of Conservation and Natural Resources and such landowners shall not be responsible for any accidents or injuries that may occur.

HUNTERS SHALL SUBMIT DEER HEADS FOR CHRONIC WASTING DISEASE (CWD) TESTING FROM ALL DEER HARVESTED AT THE WMA CHECK STATION OR DROP-OFF SAMPLING FREEZER LOCATIONS OR A SCHEDULED DCNR MOBILE SAMPLING LOCATION.

ALL DEER HARVESTED IN FREEDOM HILLS WMA MUST BE PROPERLY RECORDED AND REPORTED THROUGH THE GAME CHECK SYSTEM PURSUANT TO REGULATION 220-20-.146 NO WHOLE DEER BODY PARTS SHALL BE TRANSPORTED OUTSIDE OF BUFFER ZONE (LAUDERDALE COUNTY EAST OF HWY 43). AND ALL OF COLBERT COUNTY). ONLY MEAT THAT HAS BEEN COMPLETELY DEBONED; CLEANED SKULL PLATES WITH ATTACHED ANTLERS, IF NO VISIBLE BRAIN OR SPINAL CORD TISSUE IS PRESENT; UNATTACHED BARE ANTLERS OR SHEDS; RAW CAPES, IF NO VISIBLE BRAIN OR SPINAL CORD TISSUE IS PRESENT; UPPER CANINE TEETH, IF NO ROOT STRUCTURE OF OTHER SOFT TISSUE IS PRESENT; AND FINISHED TAXIDERMY PRODUCTS OR TANNED HIDES CAN BE TRANSPORTED OUTSIDE OF THE BUFFER ZONE.

HUNTING DATES:

DEER:	(Archery)	Stalk Hunting, Hunter’s Choice: Jan. 7 – Feb. 10. no seasonal or daily bag limit restrictions and no antler restrictions.
TURKEY:		CLOSED.
RACCOON, OPOSSUM, & FOX:		Feb. 11 – Mar. 6. (Nighttime hours only). Fox hunting: Dogs Only - No Weapons.
DOVE:		Closed.
GOOSE:		Closed
CROW:		Feb. 11 – Mar. 6.
FERAL SWINE (Special Season):		Feb. 11 - Oct. 24. Shotguns using slugs only, primitive weapons, bow and arrow, and crossbows. No Dogs Allowed. Daylight Hours Only.
RABBIT & SQUIRREL:		Feb. 11 - Mar. 6. Fox Squirrel season closed during February and March.
RAIL:		Closed.
SPECIAL TEAL SEASON:		Closed.
QUAIL:		Feb. 11 - Feb. 28.
SNIFE:		Closed.
WATERFOWL:		Closed.
WOODCOCK:		Closed.
BOWFISHING:		Mar. 1 – Aug. 31 (Nongame fish only).
BOBCAT, COYOTE, FERAL SWINE, BEAVER, RACCOON, OPOSSUM & FOX:		Feb. 11 - Mar. 6 during any other scheduled WMA Hunting Season using weapons and ammunition approved for those hunts. No Dogs Allowed. Daylight Hours Only.
FURBEARER TRAPPING (excluding feral swine):		Oct. 30 - Feb. 28. Trapping permits must be obtained from Area Biologist.

(ii) KEY CAVE NATIONAL WILDLIFE REFUGE: HUNTING ALLOWED ONLY FOR THE FOLLOWING SPECIES AND ONLY ON MONDAYS, TUESDAYS, FRIDAYS AND SATURDAYS WITHIN THE FOLLOWING SEASONS:
(Lauderdale County)

DEER:	(Archery)	Stalk Hunting, Hunters Choice: Dec. 26 – Feb. 10. Two deer per day, one unantlered deer and one antlered buck. CLOSED.
TURKEY:		Sep. 1 – Mar. 6.
RACCOON, OPOSSUM, & FOX:		State season (12:00 Noon until sunset on opening day, then ½ hour before sunrise until sunset).
DOVE:		Sep. 11 - Mar. 6. Fox Squirrel season closed during February and March.
RABBIT & SQUIRREL:		Sep. 11 – Mar. 6.
QUAIL:		Nov. 6 – Feb. 28.
WOODCOCK & SNIFE:		State season
BOBCAT, COYOTE, FERAL SWINE, RACCOON, OPOSSUM & FOX:		Open during any other scheduled WMA Hunting Season using weapons and ammunition approved for those hunts. No Dogs Allowed. Daylight Hours Only.
FERAL SWINE (Special Season)		Sep. 11 – Oct. 24. Shotguns using slugs only, primitive weapons, bow and arrow, and crossbows. No Dogs Allowed. Daylight Hours Only.
WATERFOWL, RAIL & FURBEARER TRAPPING:		CLOSED

BAG LIMITS:
Deer – see above deer hunt schedule for limits; *Raccoon* - 5 per day; *Opossum* - No Limit; *Fox* - 1 per day; *Dove* – 15 a day; *Goose* – State Bag Limit; *Crow* - No Limit; *Feral Swine, Bobcat, and Coyote* - No Limit; *Rabbit* - 8 per day; *Squirrel* - 8 per day; *Rail* – 15 a day; *Special Teal Season* – State bag limit; *Quail* – 8 a day; *Snipe* – 8 a day; *Waterfowl* – State bag limit; *Woodcock* – 3 a day (Possession of migratory birds is 3 times the daily bag limit); Falconers may take migratory game birds (not more than 3 per day in aggregate combination) and resident game birds and animals following the bag limits listed above for firearms and archery.

PERMITTED FIREARMS, BOW AND ARROW, & FALCONRY:

All WMA Seasons: Weapons and ammunition defined in 220-2-.55 (excluding buckshot) and archery equipment in 220-2-.03.
Falconry will be legal on all WMA scheduled hunts for legally permitted falconers; following the dates those seasons are open on each WMA.

IT SHALL BE UNLAWFUL:

***Users should refer to WMA Regulation 220-2-.55 for the complete list of WMA regulations.**

- To hunt, trap, use dogs, possess firearms, traps, or bow and arrow, except on open designated target ranges and except bow fishing equipment, without a valid Area Permit, or by using the Outdoor Alabama App. An AREA permit or Outdoor Alabama App Check-In application is valid only during scheduled AREA seasons during legal hunting hours and only with the required hunting license(s) and stamps and only with weapons and ammunition permitted for hunting the wildlife listed on permit.
- For any person to possess or to carry in or on a vehicle, any of the following: any firearm [including pistols/handguns] with ammunition in the magazine, breech or clip attached to firearms, or black powder weapons with primer, cap or flash powder in place, or cocked crossbow. (Nothing in this regulation prohibits or requires an AREA Permit for the possession of handguns by lawfully licensed persons for personal protection, provided the handguns are not used to hunt or take or to attempt to take wildlife except as otherwise provided by this regulation.)
- To use dogs for hunting of deer, turkey, or feral swine. (Leashed dogs may be used for the express purpose of retrieving wounded deer, limited to two dogs per tracking event).
- To use dogs for hunting, training, or any other purpose outside any AREA established season.
- For any person under 16 years of age to hunt on the WMA unless accompanied by an adult who is either 21 years old or older or the parent, and who is in possession of all state hunting licenses required to hunt the WMA.
- To camp in the WMA except in designated sites. Individuals or groups may camp on the WMA for a period not to exceed nine (9) days in any 30-day period. Campfires must be extinguished before departing. No warming fires shall be permitted away from camping area.
- To kill or willfully molest any species of wildlife except those designated game species while legally hunting.
- To transport harvested deer or turkey from the WMA before recording harvest on the Outdoor Alabama App or Daily Permit and checking such harvest at the WMA check station for data collection if the hunt date is indicated as a mandatory check station day on the Outdoor Alabama App or Area Permit. All other harvested game must be recorded on Outdoor Alabama App or Daily Permit.
- To discharge fireworks at any time.
- To discharge firearms for target practice except on the designated target ranges.
- To hunt or discharge firearms within 150 yards of any camping area, dwelling, dam, or timber operation, 100 yards of any paved public road or highway, within a posted safety zone, or from within the right-of-way of any developed road which is open to vehicular traffic.
- To possess alcoholic beverages outside designated camping areas.
- For any person, except authorized personnel, to operate any motor driven vehicle behind, under, or around any locked gate, barricaded road, or sign which prohibits vehicular traffic.
- For any unauthorized person to possess and/or operate ANY UNLICENSED MOTOR DRIVEN VEHICLE on WMA, except when utilized for the express purpose of hunting, fishing, trapping, camping, or related activities; and when operated only on regularly used roads depicted on WMA map to be open to for public four-wheel motorized vehicle traffic.
- For any unauthorized person to operate ANY LICENSED MOTOR DRIVEN VEHICLE on WMA, except when utilized for the express purpose of hunting, fishing, trapping, camping, or related activities; and when operated only on regularly used roads depicted on WMA map to be open to for public four-wheel motorized vehicle traffic.
- For any person to possess, deposit, distribute, or scatter grain/corn, salt, litter, or any other materials on WMA without receiving approval from the Wildlife and Freshwater Fisheries Division.
- To damage or remove any artifacts, trees, firewood, plants, dirt, gravel, or sod without legal authorization.
- To erect any permanent tree stand; install any screw-in style steps, spikes, or nails; or otherwise damage any tree.
- To hunt from an elevated stand or platform without attaching themselves to the tree or platform with a full body safety harness capable of supporting their weight.
- For any unauthorized person to ride or possess horses on WMA except as detailed in Regulation 220-2-.55 (v) & (w).

WMAs are provided by the Wildlife Section of the Division of Wildlife and Freshwater Fisheries, Alabama Department of Conservation and Natural Resources, in cooperation with the Tennessee Valley Authority and U.S. Fish and Wildlife Service.
